

Toyo Study Abroad Program Fact Sheet for 2024 Spring Enrolment

【Program to Develop the Japanese Language and Multicultural Communication Skills of International Professionals through Intensive Japanese Study (IUEP) / Japan-Korea 3+1 Program】

Eligibility	
Overview	<p>About the Programs and Purposes</p> <p>【 Program to Develop the Japanese Language and Multicultural Communication Skills of International Professionals through Intensive Japanese Study (IUEP)】</p> <p>Utilizing the scheme of the exchange program, this program is for students aiming for J1 or higher in the BJT business Japanese proficiency test as "highly skilled Japanese professionals". During the study abroad period, in addition to taking regular courses, students can also take business Japanese courses, participate in internships (5 days to 1 month) at Japanese companies, NPOs, chambers of commerce, etc., and participate in international student exchange events in order to deepen understanding of Japanese companies and society.</p> <p>【Japan-Korea 3+1 Program】 (only for Korean Universities)</p> <p>The Japan-Korea 3+1 Program is a program for Korean students who strongly desire to find a job in Japan after graduation. During the study abroad period, in addition to taking regular courses, students can also take business Japanese courses, participate in internships (5 days to 1 month) at Japanese companies, NPOs, chambers of commerce, etc., and participate in international student exchange events in order to deepen understanding of Japanese companies and society.</p>

Students can access the certificate on our website and Toyo Net-ACE.</p>
Application fee Tuition	Students do not need to pay application fees or tuition.
Scholarship	<ul style="list-style-type: none"> • All participating students will receive housing support of 51,000 yen per month. Additionally, selected students will also be eligible for scholarship of 80,000 yen per month. • One student from each university can receive both housing support and scholarship. If there are two or more applicants from the same university, only the selected student will be awarded the scholarship. Toyo will make a comprehensive

	<p>decision during the screening process based on academic performance and reasons for applying. Selection result will be announced at a later date.</p> <p>[only to students from UK and Australia]</p> <ul style="list-style-type: none"> All students coming to Toyo through IUEP's exchange program from project partners in UK and Australia will receive financial assistance of 131,000 yen, which includes 51,000 yen for housing support and 80,000 yen as an additional scholarship. <p>*Notes: As for staying in March 2024 and February 2025, the number of days staying in the dormitory will be less than 30 days, so there will be no housing support. Rent (a daily rate) and linen fee (2,300 yen) are to be paid by the student.</p>																				
Important considerations	<p>Support system - If you need special support or accommodations because of any sort of disability (learning or otherwise), please consult with us at the time of application. A note from your physician and an accommodation letter from your home university will be required. We will contact you to confirm your situation.</p> <p>Affiliated faculty - During your study abroad program, you will be assigned to a faculty at Toyo that may not necessarily match the faculty/department of your home university. The faculty with which you are affiliated has no bearing on the courses you take while at Toyo.</p> <p>Academic level - Graduate students who participate in the study abroad program at Toyo are regarded as undergraduate students; however, graduate students who satisfy certain conditions may take some graduate level coursework.</p> <p>Change of period of study – After you have submitted your online application, it is not possible to change your period of study.</p> <p>Course list – Not all Toyo courses are available for study abroad students. Study abroad students choose courses from the list of courses for study abroad students at Toyo. The course list will be available about one month before the semester starts.</p> <p>After exchange program – You need to return to your country within about two weeks after semester ends. You cannot join internship/ any other activities in Japan after your exchange period.</p>

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Life in Japan	
Meals	<p>Campus cafeteria: Meals are available for about 550 JPY. The cafeteria is open 10:00 am to 8:00 pm, Monday through Saturday except during the university's long vacation periods and holidays.</p> <p>There are many supermarkets, convenience stores, and restaurants around Hakusan Campus.</p>
Health Insurance	<p>Study abroad students are required by Japanese law to enroll in Japanese National Health Insurance (NHI). The insurance fee is approximately 1,500 JPY per month. With Japanese National Health Insurance, students only have to pay 30% of the medical costs when they go to see doctors. More details about the insurance are provided during orientation sessions to be held upon your arrival. You will apply for NHI during orientation. In addition, we strongly recommend you to make arrangements for voluntary travel insurance in your home country that covers emergencies.</p>
Student ID card	<p>Toyo University issues study abroad students a student ID card, which is used to access Toyo University's libraries and PC rooms. This card also allows students to obtain discounts for travel fares, museum entrance fees, theater fees, etc.</p>
Bank account	<p>Study abroad students can open a bank account with a Japanese bank after they arrive in Japan. It takes about two weeks to open a bank account. Remittances from overseas to Japan usually take approximately one week to 10 days. We strongly recommend bringing a credit card which can be used in Japan. You cannot apply for a Japanese credit card until 6 months after you have registered as a resident.</p>
Part-time work	<p>As a study abroad student, it is possible to get a part-time job and work up to 28 hours per week. To do so, you must acquire Permission to Engage in Activity Other than that Permitted under the Status of Residence Previously Granted. You may get this Permission at the airport upon arrival or by going to the Regional Immigration Bureau.</p>

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Visa Procedure	
<p>Study abroad students are required to obtain a Certificate of Eligibility and a visa for entering Japan.</p> <ul style="list-style-type: none"> • [Certificate of Eligibility] After you submit your completed application for Certificate of Eligibility (COE) to Toyo University Support Office for COE and Status of Residence (TUGS Office), they will apply for your COE to the relevant immigration bureau. We will then send the COE to you. • [Visa] A visa should be obtained in a Japanese diplomatic office in your home country. 	
Certificate of Eligibility (COE)	<p>You need to present your COE when you apply for a visa at a Japanese diplomatic office in your country. The COE also has to be submitted to the immigration officer when you receive landing screening at the port of entry. The certificate becomes invalid unless you apply for landing (entry into Japan) within three months of its issuance.</p> <p>* The Certificate of Eligibility verifies, at the time of landing screening, that the activity in which a foreigner wishes to engage in Japan is not false and that the activity matches landing qualifications such as being an activity stipulated by a relevant status of residence under the immigration law (except the status of residence for short-time [three months] visitors). This document is issued by a regional immigration bureau under the jurisdiction of the Ministry of Justice to foreign nationals in advance of their arrival in Japan.</p>
Financial Supporting Documents	<p>In order to obtain the COE, you are required to submit proof (in the form of bank statements, certificates of scholarships, etc.) that you can support yourself financially with the equivalent of 120000 JPY per month for your study period.</p>
Visa	<p>A visa is issued at a Japanese diplomatic office in your country. It is usually issued within five days of application. You are expected to enter Japan within three months of the issuance of the visa. The visa you will obtain is valid either for one year or 6 months, allowing you to enter Japan multiple times during your stay.</p> <p>* A visa signifies the judgment that a foreigner wishing to enter Japan has been deemed suitable to enter and stay in Japan. Please be aware that a visa does not guarantee the permission of entry (stay), but is deemed as one of the requirements for landing application at the port of entry (airport/seaport). As in many countries, Japan has a system in which a foreigner wishing to enter Japan is required to have permission from immigration offices, i.e. the said Certificate of Eligibility, in addition to a visa.</p>

Designated Date of Your Arrival in Japan

It is not permissible to use the AI House before the designated date or to be absent from any orientation session due to late arrival in Japan. Please come to Japan by the designated dates even if you do not plan to reside in the AI House.

Orientation

All important information on living and studying in Japan will be provided in detail during orientation. The orientation will cover student registration, issuance of an academic transcript, procedures to be taken at the immigration office and ward office, National Health Insurance, how to open a bank account in Japan, housing, and student life on and off campus. Study abroad students are required to attend the orientation.
